Director's Notes

A large part of the underlying power of Eugene O'Neill's plays is rooted in a perpetual sense of restlessness. Like the playwright himself, O'Neill's characters are plagued by doubts, fears, and a desire to find relief. Many of these fictional figures feel they do not belong and because O'Neill is a good dramatist, he sends his characters out into the worlds of their plays to wrestle and reckon with what is amiss. Often these characters, after reflection, choose retreat.

But one of O'Neill's desperate misfits takes a different tack. Robert "Yank" Smith in *The Hairy Ape* finds himself equally out of place and in pain, but instead of manufacturing a private refuge, he barrels headfirst into the world around him seeking to prove how he fits, not how to escape the world. Driven by an unmatched desire to find where he belongs, Yank is O'Neill's ultimate seeker.

Historically, *The Hairy Ape* gets attention for its commentary on social class, but with this production we are striving for a more personal journey. An ensemble of five actors will embody the imaginings of a single man as he struggles with who he is and where he is supposed to be. On the surface, the hard-boiled Yank seems very different from most of us, but through the experience of witnessing his desire to feel connected, audiences will immediately recognize something within themselves.


Dramaturg's Notes



Production Team

Eric Fraisher Hayes (Director) has been with EONF since 2008. Over his tenure, the Foundation has become the leading producer of the plays of Eugene O'Neill in the world. He has directed 34 of O'Neill's 51 titles ranging from the much-heralded Long Day's Journey Into Night and The Iceman Cometh to the rarely produced Days Without End and All God's Chillun Got Wings. As a scholar practitioner, Eric is a frequent contributor to the Eugene O'Neill Review where he writes about his experiences directing the plays of America's greatest playwright. His productions of Hughie, Long Day's Journey Into Night, Welded, Shell Shock, "Anna Christie," and adaptations of the early O'Neill one-acts Warnings, Before Breakfast, and A Wife for a Life have been performed at the Eugene O'Neill International Festival of Theatre in New Ross, Ireland. Additionally, in 2024, he directed the world

premiere of *Teddy* by Irish playwright Sheila Forsey. This October he will be returning to Ireland to direct the premiere of Forsey's *The Memory Room* as well as remounting this production of *The Hairy Ape*. Thank you to Nikki and Michael Hayes, and Megan Amanda Miller for supporting Eric's artistic career. Without their help he would not be doing the work you see today.

Sara Harris (Stage Manager) is excited to be joining the Eugene O'Neill Festival at Tao House for the first time. They are a theater maker and educator based in San Francisco. Props and lighting credits include *Macbeth, Legends of Realism, Rocky Horror Show* (Las Positas College), *Doctor Faustus Lights the Lights, Next to Normal* (Yale Dramatic Association). Sara also plays saxophone and serves as the Production Manager for the San Francisco Pride Band.

Carlos-Antonio Aceves (Set and Projection Designer) is a multidisciplinary Designer and Theater Maker whose practice focuses on new works and social justice theater. Selected scenic and multimedia designs credits include: Returning to Haifa, Golden Thread Productions; Yaga, Marin Theatre; The Displaced, Crowded Fire Theater; Breakdown, San Francisco Mime Troupe; PrEP Play, or Blue Parachute, New Conservatory Theatre Center; Dream Hou\$e, Shotgun Players; Justice, Marin Theatre; Carrie: The Musical (projection design), American Conservatory Theater YC; Cruzar la Cara de la Luna, West Edge Opera; Cyrano, Aurora Theatre Company; and Hedwig and the Angry Inch, Shotgun Players. Rob Evans' (Sound Designer and Music Director) work for the O'Neill Festival includes designing productions of *The Iceman Cometh, Desire Under the Elms, The Emperor Jones, Hughie, Long Day's Journey Into Night, A Moon for the Misbegotten, "Anna Christie",* and *Mourning Becomes Electra;* and for staged readings: *Dynamo, Bound East for Cardiff, Days Without End, The Great God Brown, Warnings Before Breakfast,* and *A Wife For A Life.* Other credits include *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof, Of Mice and Men, Good People, The Piano Lesson, Laughing Stock, Lend Me A Tenor, Copenhagen, Proof,* and *The Seagull.* Additionally, he has composed original scores for *Macbeth, A Midsummer Night's Dream,* and *Twelfth Night.*

Jeff Beyer (Lighting Designer) is a Lighting and Effects designer from California whose work spans stages, attractions, and cruise ships across the United States and the Bahamas. Of all his projects, lighting the Old Barn stands out as his favorite; his first show there was *Chris Christophersen* in 2013. The lighting system has evolved under his direction, growing from a basic "2 lights on a pole" setup to today's advanced system. Blending artistry with technical skill, Jeff aims to craft environments that transport audiences and leave a lasting impression.

Jeff Hamby (Costume Designer) is a graduate of the San Francisco State University Theatre Design MFA Program. Originally from North Carolina, Jeff attended the University of North Carolina at Charlotte where he received a Bachelor of Arts in Theatre and History. Since then he has worked with companies such as Mountain Play Association of Marin, Children's Theatre of Charlotte, American Conservatory Theater, Pennsylvania State University, and The Lost Colony. Jeff is the Costume Shop Manager at Palo Alto Children's Theatre and teaches Costume Design and Technology at Solano Community College.

Michele Apriña Leavy (Movement Consultant) Regional choreography and acting credits include: American Conservatory Theater, Berkeley Repertory Theatre, Center Rep, and California Shakespeare Theater, among others. Farther afield: Theatre Key West (Florida), The Elephant Theatre Company (Los Angeles), and Theatre 167 (NYC). Michele is a faculty member with the UC Davis Department of Theatre and Dance.

Robin Taylor (Dialect Consultant) has worn many hats in a 50-year career in the theatre. Productions of the O'Neill Foundation provided rich opportunities for him to coach actor's dialects. *The Iceman Cometh* required 14 accents, including Dutch! He learned to teach dialects while mastering the International Phonetic Alphabet under the tutelage of Edith Skinner at the Juilliard School. *The Time of Our Lives*, by Deborah Fezelle, reveals the turbulence at the Juilliard Drama Department while Robin trained there as part of the infamous Group IV. His last performance in the O'Neill Festival was as director/singer in *A Kurt Weill Cabaret*.

Beth Wynstra (Dramaturg) is Associate Professor of English at Babson College. She is the author of *Vows, Veils, and Masks: The Performance of Marriage in the Plays of Eugene O'Neill* (University of Iowa Press, 2023) and is the Vice President of the Eugene O'Neill Society.

Chad Deverman (Assistant Director) is a former actor who crossed over to the dark side and now works in Tech. As a performer he was lucky enough to work with such companies as ACT, TheatreWorks, SF Playhouse, Aurora Theatre, CalShakes, and more. Chad also coordinated and taught education programs for the Eugene O'Neill Foundation from 2010–16. He'd like to thank Eric for the opportunity to tag along on this ride to the zoo.
